

Order of the Ivory Burns



18/07/1989

President Daniel Toroitich arap Moi torches a 12 tonne pile of ivory worth an estimated one million US dollars at what would be the Ivory burning site.



20/06/2011

5 tonnes of ivory are set on fire by President Mwai Kibaki at the KWS Law Enforcement Academy (LEA) in Manyani, Tsavo West National Park



03/03/2015

15 tonnes of ivory are set on fire by President Uhuru Kenyatta at Nairobi National Park, where he led other Kenyans to celebrate World Wildlife Day.



30/04/2016

Presidents Uhuru Kenyatta and Ali Bongo (Gabon) light a fire to 105 tonnes of ivory and 1.35 tonnes of rhino horns at the ivory burning site in Nairobi National Park.
